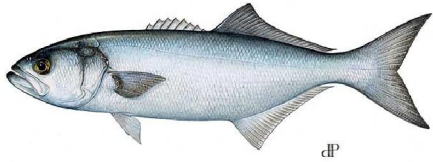
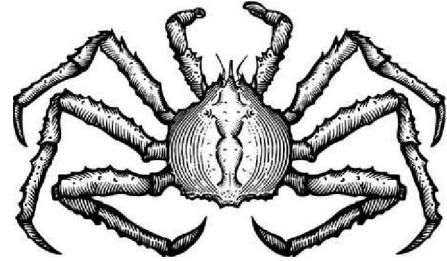

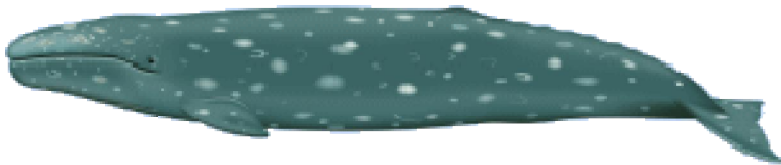
Review the species below and their given home ranges. Please circle those species that whalers could expect to see while sailing between New Bedford and the Azores.

Range: Tropical coral reefs of the Pacific Ocean

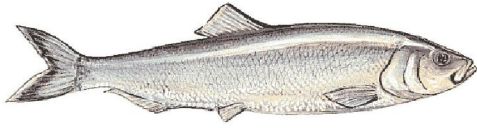


Flying Fish

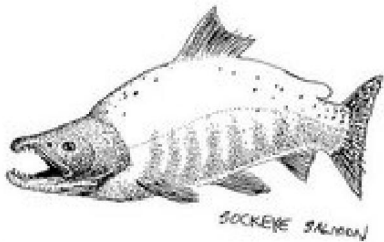
Atlantic Herring

Washington and British Columbia



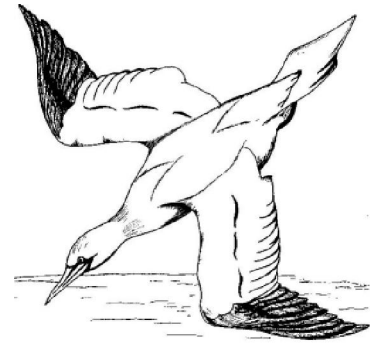
Copepod
